



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Answers to the above questions:

Q1. Answer: (b)

I is invalid because of being an extreme action.

Il is a proper corrective measure.

Q2. Answer: (e)

I follows because holding the elections at this juncture would render the exercise meaningless.

Il follows for 'heavy damage'.

Q3. Answer: (d)

None focuses on the real reason for unemployability.

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Q4. Answer: (b)

Poor maintenance of vehicles may lead to pollution but is seldom a cause of the accident.

Hence, I do not follow. But II follows as a violation of traffic rules is the chief cause of accidents.

Q5. Answer: (e)

Both I and II follow, because providing nourishment to children needs money.

Also, making primary education compulsory is a step forward to tackle the problem of undernourishment.

Q6. Answer: (a)

I follows, because the patrolling would create a fear among the robbers and act as a deterrent.

Il does not follow, because it is not feasible.

Q7. Answer: (b)

Going for I is an extreme action and should be resorted to only when the students fail to behave themselves after repeated warnings like the one given in II.

Q8. Answer: (e)

Both I and II follow.

I follows because such an advance notice makes the passengers mentally prepared;

Il follows as an inevitable course of action.

Q9. Answer: (b)

The only Course of action II follows as primary education may eradicate the problem.

Q10. Answer: (a)

The only Course of action I can follow as a public awareness programme should be expanded immediately.

Q11. Answer: (e)

The situation can be tackled by periodic cuts in supply, and urging people to conserve water. So both the courses follow.

Q12. Answer: (a)

Clearly, increased migration would add to the burden on the city's infrastructure.

Q13. Answer: (d)

Hence, none of the courses follows. Instead, certain incentives and promotional schemes should be awarded to cinema hall owners so that they could manage to draw in crowds.

Q14. Answer: (d)

The ideas suggested in both I and II represent unfair means to cut competition.

The correct way would be to devise methods and techniques such that the indigenous producers could produce better quality fruits and make them available in the market at prices comparable with those of the imported ones.

Hence, neither I nor II follows.

Q15. Answer: (b)

The emphasis should be not on the Government putting all the engineering graduates to jobs but on the colleges producing not 'degree - holders' but real technical minds which could compete well for gainful employment.

So, only course II follows.

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
